

I remember a college professor of mine, in the spring of 1981, telling me and my classmates that most of what we had learned over the last four years we would forget within five years, and half of what we remembered would turn out to be wrong. The most important thing we had learned, he insisted, was *how* to learn, how to think, and how to change our minds when we encountered new information. He was right about that. In fields as diverse as agriculture, medicine, law, and plumbing, those who refuse to keep learning get left behind. New information, new processes, and new challenges require us to think and act differently in order to be successful.

The same is true when it comes to faith and following Jesus. Being a spiritual person is not a matter of once discovering the "right" answers and thereafter clinging to them. It is instead a matter of lifelong learning from God, others, and one's own experiences. In the psalm above, and many other parts of the Bible, God is pictured as a teacher and the faithful as students. And Jesus' first followers were called "disciples," a synonym for students. They followed and listened in order to learn. Even after they became apostles, they did not cease to be disciples – they kept on learning, being challenged, and sometimes changing their ideas about what it meant to be a faithful Christian.

I recently read an essay by Christian writer Jonathan Merritt, who gave a definition of faithfulness that emphasized the importance of a commitment to keep learning. He wrote:

> "Faithfulness means always being humble enough to acknowledge that you haven't figured everything out, curious enough to evaluate new [ideas], and being honest enough to admit it when you realize you've gotten something wrong."

This is the kind of faithfulness Jesus was seeking when he called his disciples. It is the kind of faithfulness the early Brethren embraced when they rejected creeds in order to remain open to "further light." It is the kind of faithfulness I try to practice as I carry out my ministry. I encourage you to practice this kind of faithfulness, too.


